CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Harrison called the meeting to order at 5:35 p.m.

ITEMS FOR DISCUSSION:

Vision/Strategic Planning

Facilitator Cary Bozeman introduced himself and provided background information about himself and his 16 years of experience as a Councilmember for the City of Bellevue. He explained that when Bellevue developed a vision/strategic plan, Bellevue began with holding an economic summit. From the summit, a "think tank" team was created who recommended that the City develop a marketing plan; hire an Economic Development Specialist; provide a training program for new businesses (business incubator); develop a database inventory and mapping system of businesses in the city; develop a retention and recruitment team; develop a technology training center; develop a water supply; develop cultural diversity sensitivity; develop a learning community and work force; and develop a database on every educational facility in Bellevue.

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Council recessed at 6:40 p.m. and reconvened at 6:45 p.m.

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Mr. Bozeman asked for input on identifying Lakewood's strengths and weaknesses. The following strengths and

Public Relations

City Manager Rohlfs asked for Council's input on the proposals received in response to a request for proposal for public relations services. He indicated that the cost for services ranged from \$6,000 - \$13,000. He then distributed salary comparisons for a Public Information Officer and suggested that the position title be changed to include something like Community Relations.

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Discussion ensued on educating citizens about the theme park; staffing neighborhood associations; and hiring both a public relations consultant and a public information officer position.
